

In Search of a City

My assignment: To write about San Francisco and San Franciscans. My deadline: Now and tomorrow and all the tomorrows. My problem: To find the city and its people...

☆ ☆ BUT THERE are so many San Franciscos, so many San Franciscans. So you walk and you talk, you look and listen, and the truth goes on dancing brightly-just beyond reach. Where does the pulse of the city beat most strongly? The cliches flood into your mind, making their familiar patterns: Powell St.'s wooden merry-go-round (and the brass ring of the cable bell), Siciliano fishing boats bobbing like corks in the debris-laden waters of the Wharf. the sailboat (white and fluffy) against Alcatraz (dark and craggy), Coit Tower all golden and perfect at sunset, looking like the last time I saw Parrish (Maxfield). The picture postcard San Francisco, dream city of a million tourists, and, strangely and wonderfully, of a million residents.

☆ ☆ A MILLION PEOPLE, a million San Franciscans -where do you find the prototype? The wellworn shell-thin adjectives come to mind easily enough: sophisticated, urbane, wordly. The fashionably emaciated woman in the \$500 Little Black Suit That Will Go Anywhere, with the slim-legs-and-the even tan and the corner booth at El Prado (and a laugh that sounds suspiciously neurotic). The Montgomery St. gentleman in the homburg, with a pied a terre on Nob Hill, a house down the Peninsula, another at Tahoe, heading for lunch at Jack's (his eyes are tired, and they sneer). Mr. and Mrs. San Francisco. stepping right out of the four-color magazine ads. the real thing, the genuine article. And they've been around-everywhere, except their own city.

☆ ≁∸☆ YOU WALK ALONG Market St. and look at the San Franciscans on parade, piling into buses, bumping into each other, crowding off the curbs, darting across the intersections like waterbugs on a pond. Stout, perspiring housewives, wispy of hair and panting of breath, in cloth coats that are too short, too long, too thin. Tough young boys, all leather jacket and grease, slouching along, hands defiant in tight pockets. Schoolgirls four abreast in a sweatery cloud of giggles, swimming like bait in front of a pack of sailors. The lame, the halt, the blind and the man giving away Bible quotations, softly murmuring "Bless you" each time a passerby shoulders him aside. These are San Franciscans too busy to look up at Twin Peaks in all its green glory and the Ferry Building in its Skywayhidden shame, too involved in their own struggles to have heard of El Prado (is it a movie?) or Jack's (a bar, maybe?).

The garlicky. gregariousness of North Beach (the pizza. the Dago red; whaddya know a Joe), and at midnight the old men, gray under their wide-brimmed anonymous hats, alone in the corners of Mike's pool half and the old women looking down from the open windows in their tiny flats (but temorrow they will meet in Washington Square to talk of the good days in Lucca). You don't get the picture, all you people. Why aren't you at Kan's and the Ricksha, at New Joe's and Vanessi's and Sorrento? Acting like real San Franciscans.

THE SAN FRANCISCANS—who are they, and where? The Mayor nibbling on French bread at lunch, waving his expressive hands, talking about his boyhood struggles—he's one. So is the little Negro boy playing in the rubble of the razed Western Addition, looking around carefully, picking up a rock, heaving it through the window of a dead mansion. Russ Wolden and his handsome wife rolling along California St. at midnight in their sleek convertible—they're San Franciscans. So is the young Marina housewife pushing her baby carriage along Chestnut St., looking for bargains in the neighborhood grocery (certainly she knows about the Junior League — when her little boy is old enough to play baseball, maybe he'll be in it). Commodore Dan London, dapper in his yachting outfit, bounding up the stone steps of his St. Francis Hotelhe's a San Franciscan. So is Monk Fowler, the exfighter who peddles papers at Fifth and Mission. So is Horace Stoneham, backing his Cadillac convertible out of his Telegraph Hill apartment. So is the newcomer washing his car (with the Texas license plates) in front of the house-he-just-bought-in the Sunset District; he never heard of Ben Swig or Louis Lurie, but he's a San Franciscan all the same.

SAN FRANCISCO: all things to all people. Sunday brunch at the Lochinvar, or a hot dog at the Beach. Standing in line for a midnight movie at the Fox, or standing in line for an elevator to Top o' the Mark. Irish Coffee at the Buena Vista, a beer at Laurel Lodge, or a sunbath on the Marina Green. A cold wind ruffling the wash on the line in the old backyards of Hayes Valley, a cold martini served by a butler in a Pacific Heights mansion, coffee growing cold on a mahogany desk in a Russ Bullding office. Pigeons in the square, squirrels in the Park, queer ducks in the bushes, and a white swan to feed at the Palace of Fine Arts—little bits of a big city, impossible to glue together.

SAN FRANCISCO, yours and mine, nobody's and everybody's—always moving away just as you reach out to touch it.

Big 4 Challenge

U. S. Prods Russ To Start Serious Geneva Bidding

GENEVA, May 22 - The United States challenged the Soviet Union today to put forward "constructive" proposals on Germany to pull the Big Four Foreign Ministers' conference out of its vacuum of sterile debate.

This prod was applied after Secretary of State Christian A. Herter tried to reassure the Russians

that Allied plans for reunifying Germany contained guarantees of security to all European states, including the Soviet Union.

Herter said the U. S. did





not insist on linking disarmament measures with the German problem.

"We are 'prepared," he said, "to resume general disarmament negotiations in an appropriate forum at any time."

The American diplomat, however, appealed to Gromyko to accept the Western peace plan linking German unification over a 30-month period with successive stages of a system for European security and a start on global disarmament.

These developments came as the conference recessed for the week end after ten days of work. So far there has been no solid discussion of the Berlin crisis, German reunification, or European security plans.

Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko tried to maneuver the conference into negotiating on the proposed Soviet draft peace treaties with West Germany

An 89-year-old man was pinned to the front of his home and fatally crushed by a runaway car vesterday afternoon.

Joseph T. Paganetto, a retired refrigeration engineer, had just stepped out of the door of his home at 570 Lombard street when a hurtling car

with a frantic driver at the wheel leaped the curb and hit him.

The driver, Sue Ging Woo, 41, a pantryman, said the car's handbrake had failed on the steep hill and he had swerved up on the sidewalk to miss a group of school-Lombard at Powell a few yards away.

INJURIES FATAL

.Paganetto died an hour later at Mission Emergency Hospital.

QUESTION-I have asked the Saviour to make me His. but Satan still seems to be able to make me say and do things I ought not to do, as if he had the power to hypeictize one with evil thought .- D. L. P.

ANSWER-You say you think you are hypnotized by Satari. Before one can be hypnotized, one must yield himself and obey every command. You go on to say that you do things you ought not to do, and that seems to indicate that you have yielded yourself to the wrong master.

The Bible says, "Know ye not, that to whom ye yield yourselves servants to obey, his servants ye are to whom ye obey; whether of sin unto death, or of obedience unto righteousness.". The human heart has the power of decision. It can decide for good or evil, depending on the desire. The alcoholic must yield himself to alcohol. That goes for any other sin.

. But lying and misrepresentation have become part and parcel of our social life. Living a lie is as bad as telling a lie.
